

St Margaret's Hospital

Over the past few years, ABM has been working with ACPNG to upgrade St Margaret's Health Clinic in Oro Bay to a Level 5 hospital. The hospital will now operate as a satellite hospital to the staterun Popondetta General Hospital while upskilling and recruiting staff.

The renovating and building of staff housing is one of the main priorities at present as quite a large number are needed. Currently the focus is on the construction of houses for the Hospital Manager and the Doctor.

Once the upgrading is complete, it will greatly benefit the local community living in this remote region of Papua New Guinea.

ABM's Board and staff undertook a strategic planning exercise in 2011/2012 and identified nine goals for 2012-2017.

- 5) work closely with its Program Partners in building their capacity to deliver effective programs efficiently.
- 6) enhance its commitment to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander ministry.
- 7) have strong and open working relationships with all its Program Partners.
- 8) have high quality programs facilitated by systems which reflect best practice.
- 9) be part of a strong network of related organisations and be recognised as a leading exponent of holistic mission

THE FUTURE

ABM will continue to build a strong and effective organisation which participates in the mission of God through supporting the Anglican Church's witness to the Gospel of Jesus Christ. ABM will also continue to assist the Church in serving the poor, feeding the hungry, teaching and preaching the Gospel, healing the sick, and building strong communities of faith. The Martyrs of New Guinea – Sunday 2 September 2012

 Zephaniah 3.14-20; Psalm 130; Romans 8.33-39; John 12.20-32

No matter how bad a situation, renewal in Christ is possible. Even death cannot separate us from God's love for us which heals and restores. If we want to bear fruit for Christ we need to die – not perhaps as the Martyrs of New Guinea were called to do, but in terms of ego and will. By aligning our lives with the mind of Christ, we bear fruit and bring God glory.

Today's question: Which parts of my life need to die away so that I can bring glory to God and bear fruit?

- Pray for all who are persecuted for their faith
- Give thanks for the heroic and inspiring witness of martyrs

 James, 2.1-10 (11-13) 14-17; Mark 7.24-37

St Mark tells us of the healing of the Syrophoenician woman's daughter and of the deaf mute whose friends brought him to Jesus. In both cases, Jesus was implored to heal someone by another and he answered affirmatively.

Today's questions: Do I know anyone for whom I ought to pray? What is my prayer for them?

- Pray for all those in special need especially any known to you in particular
- Give thanks for the work of those involved in healing ministry in Australia and within ABM's Overseas Partners

St John tells us that God did not send Jesus into the world to condemn it, so that we should perish. Rather, God sent his Son to save us and grant us everlasting life. Jesus' death on the cross makes it possible for us to enjoy life with God for ever.

Today's question: How do I thank God for such a great gift as salvation?

- Give thanks for the work and witness of Holy Cross Cathedral, Geraldton
- Pray for all who are yet to know God and about the eternal life that is offered to us.

Sixteenth Sunday after Pentecost – Sunday 16 September 2012


• Proverbs 1.20-33 *or* Wisdom 7.26 – 8.1; Psalm 19; James 2.18-26; Mark 8.27-38
