Acknowledgement of Country:

Lord have mercy on us.

In this place we seek your grace and mercy for us and for all who have sinned or performed evil in this country.

God is a merciful God and always seeks to reclaim us as God's own. Today we accept this mercy in the name of God the Creator, the Son the Redeemer, and the Spirit the Sustainer.

Prayer after Communion:
