



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The Church of the Province of Central Africa

The Church of the Province of Central Africa is comprised of Anglicans in Botswana, Malawi, Zambia, and Zimbabwe. Each country faces its own challenges. For example, Zambia (in which ABM funds a gender and governance program and supports St John's Seminary) is adjusting to the effects of rapid industrialisation. ABM's partnership support in Zambia aids mostly people living in rural communities or in poor settlements near the capital cities. Empowerment of women is a particular focus of the program and all assistance has an emphasis on empowering locals and developing communities.

Internally-Displaced People, Asylum Seekers and Refugees

ABM prays for the plight of the many refugees across the world. In recent years Syria has experienced large numbers of civilian casualties, many internally displaced people and growing numbers of refugees. According to UN OCHA (Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Aid) over 4 million people are displaced within Syria and almost 2 million refugees are hosted by other countries. ABM recognises the severity of the crises surrounding such people and contributes to the humanitarian response by supporting refugees to find peace and stability in their lives.

Loving God, the Holy Family fled a mad king's murderous rage by escaping to another country in fear. We rejoice that Australia is able to offer safe haven to refugees and we thank you for all the gifts and skills they bring to this country. We bring before you now:

- all who have been displaced from their homes by natural or human-caused disasters in their countries
- all who flee to other countries from persecution in their own
- the UNHCR (United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees) as it assesses the claims of asylum seekers
- refugees adjusting to their new life in Australia
- all refugee advocates in Australia.

God of Abraham, who left his home, and of Ruth, the alien who left hers, your Son was also a refugee in Egypt. You have always commanded your people to welcome the homeless and the refugee. Forgive us when we put our own comfort above your command to do justice and love mercy. Defend, we pray, those who are forced to leave behind their homes, their families, their careers and all that is familiar. May they find in us a welcome and a new homecoming, for the love of our Lord, Jesus Christ. Amen.


